This is my first year as Chair of Ffilm Cymru Wales and I am grateful to former chair, Michael Gubbins, CEO Pauline Burt, and fellow Board members for making my entry into this role so smooth. And, I am delighted to welcome our newest Board member, Lia Kelly who joins us from Arts and Business Wales' Young People on Boards scheme. Our Board rightly reflects a diverse range of skills, interests and backgrounds.

The screen industries globally are undergoing huge disruption. New technologies are challenging filmmakers to tell stories in different formats and across existing platforms. The business of filmmaking is also changing with increasingly complex forms of co-production needed across territorial borders. Audiences also want to access film in a wider range of places, as part of festivals, in their own vicinity and on both large and small screens. That is why we continue to support access to film in English and Welsh-languages across all of Wales, with an audience focus at the heart of our policies.

Film belongs to us all; it must tell all our stories. Audiences should be at the heart of development. At Ffilm Cymru, that drives our support for a diversity of talent and films – both features and shorts – from development through to production. Our innovative Hatch programme, for example, has been designed to increase support for live-action family films providing producers with a richer understanding of what family audiences need and enjoy.

Film cannot be the preserve of the few. That means opening up the film industry so that people behind the camera are reflective of Wales as a whole. I am therefore immensely proud of Ffilm Cymru's Foot in the Door programme, which provides training and work opportunities for people across Wales who are not in education, employment or training. In June 2019, we celebrated this programme with our housing association partners, Deputy Minister Lee Waters AM, director Euros Lyn (Y Llyfrgell/ The Library Suicides; Dream Horse; His Dark Materials) and most importantly, our trainees themselves. They are inspiring advocates for how giving people a chance to work on set can transform life opportunities. Across the world, people are talking about changing the film industry. Here in Wales, we're already doing it.

Over the past twelve months, there have been some significant developments in Wales' screen cultures. The National Assembly drew on Ffilm Cymru's expert evidence in its Inquiry into Film and High-End Television Production. We provided input into stakeholders' meetings with Welsh Government in their planning for Creative Wales and look forward to seeing how this development progresses.

Ffilm Cymru has also long argued for the importance of business and audience-centred innovation from the early stages of development. This thinking is at the heart of our Magnifier approach – now in its fourth year- so we were delighted to see Clwstwr, a partnership of Cardiff's three universities and screen industries, win funding to further boost innovation in the city regions' screen industries.

Partnership and collaboration run through our DNA. As Chair, I am committed to ensuring we work with partners across industry, the arts and civic society to build a sustainable, creative and inclusive film culture in Wales. We look forward to working with many partners - new and established over the next 12 months and beyond.



Ffilm Cymru supports aspiring filmmakers in realising their creative ambitions by providing funding, career guidance and mentoring opportunities through our BFI NETWORK programmes.

Our short film fund Beacons, in partnership with BBC Cymru Wales, supported 11 new projects with targeted script development, before progressing seven of them into production. This fresh crop of short films reflects the distinctive voices and broad visions of the emerging talent Wales has to offer, including:

- Zillah Bowes' mid-Wales drama *Mist*, produced through Ken Loach's Sixteen Films;
- Griff Lynch's documentary Takeshi, which follows a Japanese lecturer with an incredible and unusual passion for • Welsh language and culture;
- Efa Blosse-Mason's Leaf Boat an animation about fear, gueer love and a boat made of leaves.

Horizons is our fast and flexible fund that nurtures new and emerging talent, tailors support for individual projects, and progresses career development. This year's Continuing Professional Development funding awards afforded filmmakers the opportunity to attend festivals and training events across Europe, allowing them to forge industry relationships and learn from international experts. Claire Fowler's funding supported her to attend the BFI London Film Festival in October 2018 with her short film Salam following its premiere at Tribeca earlier that year, artist and aspiring filmmaker Tina Pasotra pitched her Beacons-funded short film I Choose at Clermont-Ferrand Short Film Market, and Ila Mehrotra further developed her feature documentary Hijra at the EsoDoc training initiative in Norway, followed by opportunities to pitch at Sheffield Doc/Fest.


Our Horizons fund also provided grants to support emerging Welsh talent in making their first features:

- Clapham Trashbag, Peter Darney's cinematic adaptation of his play Five Guys Chillin', which explores chemsex in the gay community;
- Writer Crystal Jeans is adapting her own novel Vegetarian Tigers of Paradise for film a funny and foul-mouthed love story between a mum and her daughter;
- Writer-Director Ozgur Uyanik's psychological thriller Holy Men, which follows a Turkish TV reporter as she attempts to expose a fake Islamic exorcist.

BFI NETWORK Wales reached even more aspiring filmmakers with practical training events such as the Filmmakers' Survival Guide, a script masterclass with Kate Leys, and a series of one-to-one surgeries taking place across the nation.



BFI NETWORK WALES



Through our Development fund, Ffilm Cymru turns feature film ideas into reality. We develop world-class live-action, documentary and animated feature films that tell universal stories from unique perspectives.

On behalf of the Arts Council of Wales, this year we distributed over £300,000 in the development of 20 projects from Welsh writers, directors and producers, including:

- Ironmistress, Swansea writer-director Jamie Jones' follow-up to his feature debut Obey, which tells the story of 19th century English aristocrat Emma Seymour, whose relationship with Welsh ironworker Dic Penderyn will end in revolution, blood and martyrdom.
- *Chuck Chuck Baby,* Janis Pugh's musical lesbian love story inspired by her time working in a north Wales chicken factory.
- The Killing of Butterfly Joe, a cinematic adaptation of Rhidian Brook's novel about a Welsh writer who embarks on an American adventure with charismatic butterfly salesman Joe Bosco.
- Two projects from Elwen Rowlands and Hayley Manning's new company Little Door Productions: *Gone*, an adaptation of Min Kym's major literary memoir of love, loss and redemption, and *The Owl Service*, a young-adult fantasy film based on Welsh myth.

We believe children and families should be able to enjoy an exciting variety of cinematic stories. That's why our new Hatch fund, launched in May 2018, develops live-action family films that reflect the books, games, plays and poems they already love.

The four projects from Welsh talent that shared almost £85,000 in Hatch development funding are:

- *Deian a Loli*, the story of boy and girl twins that use their magical powers to cope with their parents' divorce. Based on their popular S4C children's television programme, this Welsh-language film will be written by Manon Wyn Jones and produced by Cwmni Da's Angharad Elen.
- *Demolition Dad*, a story about Jake and his father, who wrecks buildings by day, and wrestles in spandex by night. Based on Phil Earle's novel, the film will be written by Keiron Self and Giles New, and produced by Sarah Broughton.
- Based on Vivien Alcock's novel, *The Monster Garden* follows young girl Frankie, who accidentally creates a monster with a tissue sample from her scientist father's lab. The film will be written by HLS Duncan, directed by Keir Burrows and produced by Josephine Rose.
- An adaptation of 80s TV series *Super Gran*, about a grandmother who uses her superpowers to fight evil politicians, directed by Keri Collins and produced by Sarah Brocklehurst.

Dream Horse

Ffilm Cymru's Production funding progresses film feature film projects from script to screen.

This year we invested almost £800,000 of National Lottery funds in eight films from Welsh talent inspired by the stories and voices of Wales, including:

- and Welsh Government, while Warner Bros UK will release it in the UK.
- (Set Fire to the Stars).
- Pictures, and premiered at Venice before being selected for BFI London Film Festival.

Production funding was also awarded to two very different feature documentaries: Sleep Furiously director Gideon Koppel's exploratory United Nations, and the charming story of a Welsh male voice choir in Dylan Williams' Men Who Sing.

Additional awards were made to Steve Sullivan's inventive and intimate documentary Being Frank: The Chris Sievey Story and Jon Jones' coming-of-age drama Last Summer to support the films' theatrical release, driving them to reach audiences in cinemas across Wales.

Six Minutes to Midnight, a World War II thriller from Llandudno-based Mad as Birds Films starring Judi Dench and Eddie Izzard, which was shot in Llandudno, Carmarthen and Penarth during summer 2018 by director Andy Goddard

Rare Beasts, the directorial debut of Billie Piper, who also stars as Mandy, a mother, a writer, and a nihilist in this unhinged romantic comedy. The film is produced by Welsh filmmaker Vaughan Sivell (Prevenge) for Western Edge

We believe that a strong and sustainable Welsh film industry needs to be open to everyone, no matter a person's background or experience. That's why our free training programme provides opportunities for people not in employment, education or training to get their Foot in the Door of the film industry.

Ffilm Cymru finds and creates local opportunities to learn and develop valuable skills such as such as carpentry, hair and make-up, and costume on the set of film and television productions in Wales. We also work closely with local housing associations to offer resources and support for things like transport and childcare, making Foot in the Door an opportunity that can work for anyone, whatever their circumstances.

Having already placed trainees on film and television productions such as Gareth Evans' Netflix horror *Apostle*, Severn Screen's comedy-drama *Denmark*, and S4C / BBC Cymru Wales crime drama *Craith* / *Hidden*, we delivered our first Welsh-language Foot in the Door programme in January 2019. Three participants heard from experts at Bad Wolf Studios before embarking on a week's training on the west Wales set of Vox Pictures' hit S4C drama *Un Bore Mercher* / *Keeping Faith*, starring Eve Myles.

Ffilm Cymru followed this with our biggest ever Foot in the Door programme, providing 35 people from across Wales with training and shadowing opportunities on the set of major new feature film production *Dream Horse*. Shooting in spring 2019 in and around Blaenavon with director Euros Lyn, *Dream Horse* provided a wealth of exciting opportunities for participants of all ages to develop their skills and progress their creative careers.

We also provided practical training for aspiring filmmakers with events such as:

- Our BFI NETWORK Wales Filmmakers' Survival Guide, a day of panels, roundtable discussions and enlightening sessions on the essential, practical information every filmmaker needs to grasp in order to embark on a sustainable career in the industry;
- A masterclass on storytelling from script development expert Kate Leys with filmmakers supported through our BFI NETWORK Wales Beacons fund;
- Our collaboration with Hijinx Theatre, training Welsh filmmakers in how best to work with neurodivergent cast and crew.

We believe everyone in Wales should have access to exciting and inspiring cinematic experiences. That's why we provide funding and advice to cinemas, film festivals and pop-up screenings in community spaces throughout the nation.

Distributing Arts Council of Wales and BFI National Lottery funding, this year Ffilm Cymru made 23 Audience Access awards totalling £170,000 to projects that reached almost 320,000 people across Wales.

While we continued to support festivals such as Abertoir Horror Festival, Cardiff Mini Film Festival, Iris Prize LGBT+ Film Festival, Wicked Wales Festival and the Wales One World Film Festival to help grow their audience reach and business sustainability, we also made first time awards to two new festivals:

- Kotatsu Festival, which celebrated Japanese animation in September 2018 with a host of screenings, workshops and special guests at Aberystwyth Arts Centre and Cardiff's Chapter Arts Centre;
- FOCUS Wales in Wrexham, which this year added a film strand to its successful international showcase of Welsh music, featuring film screenings, talks, and a short film award.

As part of our commitment to providing better access to film for under-served areas and audiences, we also funded three inspiring community projects bringing cinema to non-traditional places:

- Gentle/Radical host world film screenings in community spaces across Cardiff that are accessible to all, including provides food and creche facilities, and encourages discussion with guests speakers.
- Following Ffilm Cymru's pioneering Film in Afan mobile cinema scheme, members of the local community now run went 50 years without a cinema now enjoys monthly film screenings!
- Cardiff Community Housing Associations' FLIX pop-up cinema provides free film screenings for their tenants in the Cardiff.

Our Audience Access fund also supported a collaboration with Race Council Cymru and Watch Africa Cymru, who presented a special screening of Rungano Nyoni's BAFTA award winning I Am Not a Witch to celebrate Black History Month Wales. Nyoni joined the event for a Q&A session, which was hosted by Vaughan Gething AM at the Welsh Government's Y Pierhead.

Ffilm Cymru funds film education providers to engage people of all ages and abilities in creative learning opportunities.

This year we awarded over £38,000 of BFI National Lottery funding to inspiring film education projects, including:

- A second round of CISP Multimedia's award-winning Welsh-language project Ein Stori Ni!, which gives primary school children across south Wales hands-on experience of storyboarding, filming and editing their own films. Teachers and learning support assistants were also involved to find out first-hand how they can use film and media in the classroom;
- The Iris Prize LGBT+ Film Festival's successful programme of film education and community outreach, which allows young people to explore LGBT+ issues and tell their own stories through film;
- Our collaboration with mental health charity Hafal, in which we'll work with young people aged 15-25 to examine • representation of mental health issues on film and challenge stereotypes. The project will also give participants the opportunity to get creative and share stories by making their own films.

Funding was also given to support a strand of Welsh-language education workshops at the PICS Film Festival for Young People in Caernarfon; Theatr Gwaun's Re:Action project, which provided a dedicated space for young people from Pembrokeshire to make films with accessible technology; and the WOW Women's Film Club to pilot their Ymuno filmmaking workshops for young people in Newport and Swansea, as well as animation workshops for young adults with learning disabilities, in partnership with Mencap Ceredigion.

Meanwhile, projects that were funded in 2017-18 but delivered this year engaged 774 people in film education, with 58% identifying as female and 57% coming from former Communities First areas.




